#### **MEETING NOTES**

SJHFHP and partner updates

- Partner updates
  - o Pagosa Area Tails Council
    - Seasonal crews clear trails throughout the summer.
    - Experiencing challenges with hiring seasonal employees.
      - Previously hired through the USFS.
      - Exploring options of working with San Juan Mountains Association (SJMA) to hire seasonal employees.
    - If you know anyone that might want to work on a trail crew this summer, <u>contact</u> Bob Milford.
    - Going after a \$70,000 grant to purchase an excavator for trail work.
    - Expanding the parking lot and building a bathroom at Opal Lake.
      - Rio Chama CFLRP funding earmarked for Opal Lake.
  - o Farm Bill legislation making its way up through Congress
    - Senator Michael Bennet is co-leading an effort to <u>reauthorize and expand the</u> <u>scope of the CFLRP legislation</u> through the Farm Bill, potentially with the ability to use funds for planning (NEPA).
  - Wildfire Adapted Partnership (WAP)
    - SJHFHP has a FRWRM grant through State of Colorado.
      - 200 acres near end of the airport runway.
      - Working with NRCS to come up with a plan.
      - Looking at 40-60 acres of fuels reduction and forest health work.

- 60% reimbursement to the property owner.
- Chipper rebate program to restart in mid-April.
- Cost-sharing plans for full mitigation work on private property (applies to almost everyone in the HWY 84 corridor) with 60% reimbursement.
- 40% reimbursement open to anyone in PLPOA.
  - Ongoing work in the greenbelts
- The San Juan Conservation District is sponsoring a landowner awareness day in March at the CSU extension office.
  - Most folks that are new to the area are also new to living in a rural environment.
  - Will provide opportunities for folks to learn how to live sustainably in this ecosystem.
- Fire Adapted Colorado is hosting the <u>Colorado Wildland Fire Conference</u> in Fort Collins, April 12-13.
  - Wildfire mitigation courses will be provided at the conference and online.
- o 2-3-2 Cohesive Strategy Partnership
  - Looking for folks to participate in the Biomass Committee.
    - <u>Contact Bill Trimarco</u> if you are interested.
- Studs Lumber Company
  - Working with Build Pagosa to expand their CTE programs through the high school.
  - Looking for board members
    - Contact Adam Hershberg to get involved.
    - Will be hiring an administrator/project manager soon.
  - Moving forward with their school to work program enabled through the CDC.

  - Served as a District Ranger in Vail, Colorado
  - Detailed in the Forest Supervisor position last summer

  - Press release
- Mark Lambert leaving
  - Head of Lands and Public Service Program, which oversees recreation.
- o Public comment period for the Jackson Mountain EA ends February 23<sup>rd</sup>.
- CFLRP
  - o Rio Chama
    - Finalizing multiparty monitoring plan.
  - Southwest Colorado
    - Coordinating Council and Committees
      - Coordinating Council meetings are open to the public and are held on the second Tuesday of the month.

    - Developed a set of <u>desired future conditions</u>.

- Developing a process for how projects will move from idea to implementation through the following system as outlined in the Charter:



- The Coordinating Council will provide guidance to the Projects and Places Committee to develop a tool for reviewing and evaluating potential projects.
- The Science and Monitoring Committee is still working through how best available science is brought to the project and disseminated through stakeholders.
  - If you are interested in participating in the Science and Monitoring Committee, contact Nick Olson.
- Ongoing SJHFHP involvement
  - The CFLRP is focused on restoration and bringing fire back to the ecosystem.
  - Desired conditions are the first filter for projects to flow through.
  - Alignment of priorities:
    - The PROMOTe model is being applied to the entire Pagosa Ranger District and can help identify areas for future NEPA as well as priorities in NEPA-ready acres.
  - All of the NEPA shelf stock on the Pagosa District was developed collaboratively by this group.
    - Unique to this district.
    - o Planning is the easy part, it's hard to get to implementation.

  - Deadline for applications is March 23<sup>rd</sup>.

## Weminuche Audubon Society (WAS) Bird Monitoring

- Project and partnership overview
  - The <u>Bird Community Monitoring</u> project helps us understand how forestry practices impact wildlife habitat and bird populations.
    - Started when Herb Grover got involved with the WAS and identified a common skill among members: bird identification.
    - Have more than 50 different volunteers, with 20-25 each year and about 12 volunteers that have been involved since the beginning.
  - o Sponsors the Bird of the Week in the Pagosa Sun.
  - o Provides several educational programs:
    - ~1,200 kids come through programs at the Hershey Ranch.
    - Snow science day in conjunction with the Great Backyard Bird Count.
  - Sponsors the Christmas Bird Count.
  - o Coordinates the Pagosa Wetlands Partners.
  - o Ongoing monitoring efforts in the HD Mountains are likely to expand.
    - Received a grant to purchase owl monitoring devices.
- 2022 video and report
  - o Bird Communities in the Southern San Juan Mountains of Colorado
  - O Questions/comments
    - Rio Chama has identified Lewis' woodpecker as a species of concern
      - Interested in seeing the data that WAS has collected.
      - Pagosa's large population of Lewis' woodpecker is an anomaly. There are only about 70,000 individuals worldwide.
    - Amazing photography!
      - Most of the photos were taken on site by volunteers.
- Looking forward to 2023
  - o Program applications further afield
  - Volunteer recruitment
    - Volunteer orientation in early June
  - SJHFHP birding day during the study season
    - Similar to a headwaters tour, but the tour would be us going out and collecting data for this project
