MEETING NOTES

Welcome and introductions

Collaborative decision analysis opportunity from Colorado Forest Restoration Initiative (CFRI)

- Researchers at CFRI are evaluating how collaborative groups use decision support tools (PODs, for example).
 - o Which tools have been used in processes that led to successful outcomes?
 - o How do folks find sources of information and decision support tools?
 - o How are the tools being used?
- CFRI will hold a 1.5-hour focus group with Headwaters partners to understand a decision that was made and how decision tools were used.
- Headwaters will choose one project to focus on for this study. Some options are:
 - o Fourmile/Plumtaw
 - o Jackson Mountain EA
 - o Cloman Park
 - o Reservoir Hill
- This provides an opportunity to tell a success story in a different way and learn more about what makes this group successful in decision-making.
 - o The Partnership could replicate the process to analyze additional projects after the CFRI focus group.
 - o There is interest among partners in looking at projects that weren't successful.

SJHFHP Updates

- Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) update underway
 - o A small group is meeting to get the process started.
 - o A public meeting will be held in May.
 - o All six counties in the San Luis Valley will be updating their CWPPs in the near future.
 - Opportunity for knowledge sharing re-start Bridging the Divide?
- Reservoir Hill management plan
 - o A small group is moving this process forward for now. This is still in the early stages of development.
 - o There will be opportunities for the full group to get involved later on.
- Colorado Forest Health Council visiting Pagosa April 29-30
 - o Veronica Medina is organizing a tour for the Council to showcase work in the Headwaters landscape.
 - JR Ford's work before and after visualizations
 - Plumtaw film
 - Other ideas? Contact Alex Handloff and/or Veronica.
- Field trip ideas for 2025
 - o May: Plumtaw/Fourmile site visit for future project with the San Juan National Forest
 - o June: Weminuche Audubon Society bird monitoring at Fawn Gulch (post-prescribed fire)
 - o Late summer/fall: Adaptive Silviculture for Climate Change (ASCC) site on Jackson Mountain
 - o Hidden Valley private lands work recently completed through the Forest Restoration and Wildfire Risk Mitigation (FRWRM) grant

- Pursuing funding for work in the Fourmile Watershed through the Wildfire Ready Watersheds grant
 - o Funding comes from the Colorado Water Conservation Board (CWCB)

Priority Landscape Fact Sheets update for 2025

- There is a renewed interest in this prioritization effort to inform the CWPP update.
 - o Think about how this resource might be used to attract funding in the future.
- Can this prioritization effort be tied into another planning tool, like PODs?
 - o There is a POD network for this area. It needs some work.
 - o BLOBs were used for this effort, which was initiated by the CFLRP, because PODs are too fire-focused.
- Price Lakes
 - o Change name to Navajo and Blanco watersheds
 - o Change boundary to watershed boundaries
 - Work with Caleb, Josh and Bill on where exactly the boundary should be
 - o Elk migration corridors
 - o Trailheads: Opal, Fish Creek Blanco River
 - o San Juan Chama Project Diversions
 - List percentages of Albuquerque, Santa Fe and Jicarilla Apache's drinking water that comes from these diversions.
- During a future meeting, we do a prioritization exercise with physical maps to expand on this effort.
 - o Need fire staff at the table.

Regional mapping update from Julia

- There is momentum building to align mapping efforts across the Southwest Colorado and Rio Chama CFLRPs, building on the mapping resource that Headwaters maintains.
 - o Identify areas for future cross-boundary opportunities
 - o Identify gaps
 - o Learn about what is happening in this landscape
 - o Celebrate accomplishments
 - o Reporting
 - o Leveraging funds
- Reporting/data gathering will happen in the fall, in line with reporting timelines for CFLRP and RMRI.
 - o Headwaters can continue the Mapping and Planning effort in the spring, or move it to the fall. Maybe we need to reassess the function and purpose of this meeting.
 - o SJNF outyear planning happens in April

Partner updates

- Chama Peak Land Alliance
 - o Federal grants are opening back up!
 - o Moving forward with new Community Wildfire Defense Grant (CWDG) proposal in New Mexico
 - o Hoping more BIL funding will open up.

San Juan National Forest

- o The Columbine Ranger District is hoping to do some prescribed burning in the southern HDs next week.
 - Aspect burning (southern aspects that are snow-free)
 - Will put smoke into Pagosa.
- o JR Ford's company just completed work in the Turkey Springs/Brockover area.
- o Hosting a volunteer tree planting event in the Mill Creek Basin area this spring.

• Wildfire Adapted Partnership (WAP)

- o WAP is on their last leg after losing federal funding
- o WAP is owed \$1 million for work that has been completed on a grant in Archuleta County not sure if that money will ever arrive.
- o Restructuring and trying to get emergency funding
- o Will try to continue outreach and education in Archuleta, but most on-the-ground treatments will grind to a halt.
 - Can use an older grant in the Pagosa Lakes greenbelts (SFA WUI).
 - Some projects will be able to move forward on HWY 84.

• San Juan Water Conservancy District

- o Feeling optimistic about their position
- o Looking at doing further engineering site studies to learn about permeability and feasibility of a reservoir.
- o Hosting a joint meeting on March 25th at the Pagosa Center for the Arts.

Timber Ridge

- o Identified about 40 lots that need mitigation work.
- o Over \$70k has been spent on mitigation in the neighborhood.
- o Hosting a meeting in April to educate residents about wildfire.

Pagosa Area Recreation Coalition

- o Applied for a grant (\$200k) to help clear trails
- o The Pagosa Ranger District lost trail crews
- o Moving forward with the development of a recreation plan for the Pagosa area.

Build Pagosa

- o Haven't had funding issues
- o Reach out to Adam Hirshberg if you are interested in getting involved with Build Pagosa.
- o There is interest in getting students involved with trail work in the future.

San Juan Mountains Association

o MSI and SJMA are hosting a Snow Science and Social event at Wolf Creek Pass on March 22nd – a great family activity!

• Weminuche Audubon Society (WAS)

- o Analyzing data from the sixth year of bird monitoring.
- o The number of species at the thinned site on Jackson Mountain was about the same as other sites, but the number of birds was down 20%.
- o WAS is looking forward to another year of monitoring, particularly at Fawn Gulch, which was treated with prescribed fire in the fall.

Colorado State Forest Service

o Doing as well as they can for the time being!

• Archuleta County

o Commissioners approved the County's first ever strategic plan

- Focused on creating a transparent public process and being better partners with everyone.
- Information will be visible on a dashboard.
- o Veronica Medina is meeting with the insurance commissioner, Michael Conway.
 - Show the Headwaters mapping efforts to track forest restoration treatments across the landscape
- o Attending a legislative day at the capital in Denver to highlight what federal money has been used for in terms of fire mitigation and forest health.
